Getting to Know the Candidates for Chittenden County State's Attorney

The ACLU of Vermont contacted each candidate for state's attorney in June 2022 and asked about their views and policy intentions through a series of county-specific questions. Candidates who did not respond to the survey or refused to give a yes or no answer to a question are noted as "refused to respond."

YES	POLICY DISCOURAGING RACIAL PROFILING Black people in Vermont are more likely to be stopped and searched by police, but less likely to be found with contraband, because some police officers use pretextual reasons to perform stops based on racial bias. As a prosecutor, will you discourage racial profiling by presumptively declining to prosecute cases based on pretextual stops?	REFUSED TO RESPOND
YES	POLICE ACCOUNTABILITY Will you actively track and reject the cases of police offices with histories of lying, racism, or bias?	REFUSED TO RESPOND
YES	TRANSPARENCY Will you track and publish data on your office's work by race, gender, and similar innate characteristics?	REFUSED TO RESPOND
YES	DE-FELONIZING DRUG POSSESSION Will you exercise discretion to reduce penalties for low-level drug possession?	REFUSED TO RESPOND
